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## Tips & Tricks

### Difficulty

Even though this is an intermediate pattern, I've included plenty of notes alongside video tutorials and photos to enable adventurous beginners to take part in this CAL.

### Materials

*Stone Washed/River Washed Version*

**Scheepjes Stone Washed + River Washed** (78% Cotton, 22% Acrylic; 50g/130m/142yds)

**Hook A** 5mm for main crochet work

**Hook B** 4.5mm for lace work and border

## Gauge

It is important to make sure that your gauge matches the one stated in the pattern to ensure your finished result doesn't turn out differently to what was intended. Further, if you crochet 'looser' than the gauge instructs, you risk running out of yarn before completing the project.

To verify your gauge, crochet a gauge swatch (pattern below). If your swatch ends up larger than stated, you will need to select a smaller hook size and remake your swatch. If your swatch ends up smaller, you will need to select a larger hook size and remake your swatch. Continue until your swatch matches the measurements stated below.

### Gauge Swatch Pattern:

- For Stone Washed/River Washed version: Use Stone Washed/River Washed yarns in the colours indicated beside each Round (C3, C2 etc.) and Hook A. Your swatch should measure ø 9cm/3.6in.
- For Colour Crafter version: Use Colour Crafter yarns in the colours indicated beside each Round (C3, C2 etc.) and Hook A. Your swatch should measure ø 10cm/4in.
- Do not frog your swatch afterwards! Your gauge swatch becomes the start of your blanket.





**Round 1 (C3)** Start with magic ring; ch3 (counts as first tr), 11tr in ring, join with ss in third ch of beg 3-ch. [12 tr]

**Round 2 (C3)** Ch4 (counts as 1 tr + ch 1), \*1tr in next tr, ch1; rep from \* around, join in third ch of beg 4-ch, fasten off. [12 tr, 12 ch-1 sps]

**Round 3 (C2)** St-tr in any ch-sp, 2tr in same ch-sp, \*3tr in next ch-sp (3-tr group made); rep from \* around, join with ss in first tr. [12 3-tr groups]

**Round 4 (C2)** Ch1, dc in-between two 3-tr groups (*right below the 1 ch*), \*6tr in-between next two 3-tr groups (*6-tr shell made*), 1dc in-between next two 3tr-groups; rep from \* around, omit the last dc on the last rep, join to first dc, fasten off. [6 dc, 6 6-tr shells]

**Round 5 (C4)** St-dc in the space after a 6-tr shell and before the dc, \*ch3, 1dc in the space after the dc and before the next 6-tr shell, 1BPhtr around next 6 tr, 1dc in next space; rep from \* around, omit the last dc on the last rep, join to first dc, fasten off. [48 sts, 6 ch-3 sps]

## Measurements

*Unblocked*

Stone Washed/River Washed version: 138 x 138cm (55.2 x 55.2in)

Colour Crafter version: 140 x 140cm (56 x 56in)

*Blocked*

Stone Washed/River Washed version: 140-145 x 140-145cm (56-58 x 56-58in)

Colour Crafter version: 145-150 x 145-150cm (58-60 x 58-60in)

The blocked measurements are just an indication. The most important thing is to make sure the lace is flat and your blanket is smooth.

## Left-handed Crochet

Some instructions states "left of ..." or "right of ..." If you crochet left-handed, "left of ..." will be "right of ..." and "right of..." will be "left of ..."

## Understanding the Pattern

*Standard stitches and abbreviations (UK Terminology)*

∅ diameter

**beg** beginning

**bl** back loop: when added in front of a st (such as 'blhtr') work st into the back loop only

**C** colour

**ch(s)** chain(s)

**CS** corner shape

**dc** double crochet

**dtr** double treble crochet

**fl** front loop: when added in front of a st (such as 'flhtr') work st into front loop only

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**htr** half treble crochet  
**PM** place stitch marker  
**rep(s)** repeat(s)  
**RS** right side  
**sk(d)** skip(ped)  
**ss** slip stitch(es)  
**sp(s)** space(es)  
**st(...)** stitches that have 'st-' in front of them are made as standing stitches  
**st(s)** stitch(es)  
**tr** treble crochet  
**WS** wrong side  
**yoh** yarn over hook

## Repeat Formats and Punctuation

**\*.....; rep from \* once more/twice more/3 more times/to end** work the instructions after \* and then repeat that section as specified.

*Parentheses with plain text*

**(.....) once/twice/3 times** work the instructions between brackets the total number of times stated. Parentheses are also used to indicate a group of sts to be worked into the same st/sp.

*Square Brackets*

**[...]** indicates stitch counts, but I also use them when a group of sts need to be worked into the same st/sp in cases when using parentheses would be confusing.

*Parentheses with italic text*

**(*italic text*)** indicates notes and tips throughout the pattern.

## Special Stitches and Abbreviations

If you need help with any of the sts below, you can find photo tutorials on my blog, or you can watch the video tutorials made by Esther from It's All in a Nutshell blog.

### **2FPdtr-cl**

2 front post double treble cluster: \*yoh twice, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through 2 loops) twice; rep from \* once more around same st, yoh and draw through all 3 loops.

### **2FPtr-cl**

2 front post treble cluster: \*yoh, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and draw through first 2 loops; rep from \* once more around same st, yoh and draw through all 3 loops.

### **3dtr bobble**

3 double treble-bobble: \*yoh twice, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through 2 loops) twice; rep from \* twice more, yoh and draw through all 4.

### **4tr-bobble**

4 treble bobble: \*yoh, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and draw through 2 loops; rep from \* 3 more times, yoh and draw through all 5 loops.

### **5tr-bobble**

5 treble bobble: \*yoh, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and draw through 2 loops; rep from \* 4 more times, yoh and draw through all 6 loops.





### **6tr-bobble**

6 treble bobble: \*yoh, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and draw through 2 loops; rep from \* 5 more times, yoh and draw through all 7 loops.

### **BPdc**

Back post double crochet: insert hook from back to front to back to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and pull loop through all 2 loops.

### **BPhttr**

Back post half treble: yoh, insert hook from back to front to back to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and draw through all 3 loops.

### **BPtr**

Back post treble: yoh, insert hook from back to front to back to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh, draw through two loops) twice.

### **Camel st**

Camel stitch: work 1htr in the third loop of the stitch. The third loop is situated behind the first 2 loops that you normally work into.

### **dc2tog**

Double crochet 2 together: (insert hook in next st/sp, yoh, pull up loop) twice, yoh and draw through all 3 loops.

### **dtr2tog**

Double treble 2 together: \*yoh twice, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh, draw through first 2 loops) twice; rep from \* once more, yoh and draw through all 3 loops.

### **FPdc**

Front post double crochet: insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and draw through all 2 loops.

### **FPdtr**

Front post double treble: yoh twice, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through 2 loops) 3 times.

### **FPst**

Front post stitch: abbreviation refers to a previously worked front post stitch

### **FPtr**

Front post treble: yoh, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through 2 loops) twice.

### **FPttr-dtr-ttrtog**

Front post triple treble, double treble, triple treble together:

*ttr part*: yoh 3 times, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of first indicated st, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through first 2 loops) 3 times (*2 loops on hook*)

*dtr part*: yoh twice, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of second indicated st, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through first 2 loops) twice (*3 loops on hook*)

rep ttr part again for the third indicated st, yoh and draw through all 4 loops.

### **FPdtr-trtog**

Front post double treble and treble together:

*dtr part*: yoh twice, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of first indicated st, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through first 2 loops) twice (*2 loops on hook*)





*tr part*: yoh, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of second indicated st, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and draw through first 2 loops, yoh and draw through all 3 loops.

### **FPtr-dtrtog**

Front post treble-double treble together (*a mirror image of the FPdtr-trtog*):

*tr part*: yoh, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of first indicated st, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and draw through first 2 loops (*2 loops on hook*),

*dtr part*: yoh twice, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of second indicated st, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through first 2 loops) twice, yoh and draw through all 3 loops.

### **FPdtr2tog**

Front post double treble 2 together: \*yoh twice, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through two loops) twice (*2 loops on hook*); rep from \* for second indicated st, yoh and draw through all 3 loops.

### **FPtr3tog**

Front post treble 3 together: \*yoh, insert hook from front to back to front to go around post of st indicated, yoh, pull up loop, yoh and draw through first 2 loops; rep from \* for next two indicated sts, yoh and draw through all 4 loops.

### **htr3tog**

Half treble 3 together: (yoh, insert hook in next st/sp, yoh, pull up loop) 3 times, yoh and draw through all 7 loops.

### **Pearl-st**

*Tip: Pearl-st is essentially a small puff-st around a htr. Secure the first yoh with your index finger.*

Pearl stitch: work 1htr in indicated st/sp, (yoh, insert hook from front to back before the post of the htr, yoh and pull up loop) twice, yoh and draw through all 5 loops.

### **Popcorn-st**

Popcorn-stitch: make 5tr in the same st/sp, pull out your hook, insert hook into first st, grab loop with hook and pull it through first st.

### **Puff-st**

Puff stitch: (yoh, insert hook into st, yoh, pull up loop) 5 times, yoh and draw through all 11 loops, close with ch1.

### **qdtr**

Quadruple treble: yoh 4 times, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through two loops) 5 times.

### **qdtr2tog**

Quadruple treble 2 together: \*yoh 4 times, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and pull through two loops) 4 times; rep from \* in next indicated st/sp, yoh and draw through all 3 loops.

### **qdtr4tog**

Quadruple treble 4 together: \*yoh 4 times, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and pull through two loops) 4 times; rep from \* in next 3 indicated sts/sp, yoh and draw through all 5 loops.

### **tr3tog**

Treble 3 together: (yoh, insert hook in next st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, yoh, draw through 2 loops) 3 times, yoh and draw through all 4 loops.

### **tr5tog**

Treble 5 together: (yoh, insert hook in next st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, yoh, draw through 2 loops) 5 times, yoh and draw through all 6 loops.





### **ttr**

Triple treble crochet: yoh 3 times, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, (yoh and draw through 2 loops) 4 times.

### **ttr6tog**

Triple treble 6 together:

*First half:* \*(yoh 3 times, insert hook in indicated st/sp, yoh, pull up loop, [yoh and draw through 2 loops] 3 times) 3 times in same st/sp (*4 loops on hook*)

*Second half:* rep from \* in next indicated st/sp (*7 loops on hook*), yoh and draw through all 7 loops.

### **V-st**

V-stitch: Work (1tr, ch1, 1tr) in same st.

## **Techniques**

### **Magic Ring**

The blanket and the separate motifs start with a magic ring.

To make a magic ring:

1. Place yarn over your left index finger with the yarn end towards you and hold it in place.
2. Wrap the other end of the yarn (the working yarn) clockwise over your index finger, just like you would make a slip knot.
3. Remove the loop from your finger and hold it with your thumb and index finger.
4. Insert your hook into the loop, grab the working yarn with your hook and pull it through the oop, ch1 to secure the loop.

You can now work into the loop. When you are done with the first round, pull the yarn end to close the magic ring and weave in the end tightly. This is very important because if it is not secure, the whole blanket can unravel.

### **Standing Stitches**

Standing sts are used to start the round when using a new colour or when you need to start in a different location than where the previous round finished.

To make a standing stitch, start with a slip knot on your hook, hold the slip knot with your finger and make the stitch like normal. If you'd rather not work a standing stitch, you can replace it with a ss in the indicated st or space and chain any number of chs to get to the correct height.

### **Joining the round**

There are two ways to join the round that you can use in this blanket.

- *To join your round with a ss*, insert your hook into the first st/sp of the round and make a ss. (Do not confuse the loop of a ss with a regular st when counting your sts. It does not count as a st. So, when you work the next round, skip the loop of the ss.)
- *To join the round with a needle join:*
  1. After completing your last st, cut yarn leaving about a 10cm (4in) tail and draw tail all the way through top of last st made.
  2. Thread your needle and insert under the top loop of the second st of the round (*the first st is skipped*).
  3. Insert your needle through the middle of the top loop of the last st you made of that round, then through the loop that's beneath the back loop.
  4. Pull yarn until the loop you just made looks like all the other sts and work away your ends.

The pattern recommends to use a needle join when the next Round begins with camel st or a back post st.

### **Fastening off and working away ends**

Cut your yarn ends about 10cm (4in) long and pull the yarn all the way through the st. Work away your yarn ends through the back bumps of the sts of the same round you were working on. I usually go back and forth 5 times, making sure to go through four or more bumps, so the area doesn't get too thick.





When you come to a lacy area where ends cannot be properly worked away, I usually work away the ends in the rounds below.

### **Recognizing stitches on the right side and wrong side of your work and hidden stitches**

Sts are made out of posts and loops. It is very important to know which loops and posts belong to the same stitch, so you can recognize easily which stitch to go into.

- Recognizing sts on the Right Side (RS) of your work: The blanket is worked on the RS for the most part. When the pattern doesn't state to turn, you will only work on the RS. When you work with the RS of the sts facing you, the loop of the stitch comes before the post of the stitch, i.e.: the loop of the stitch is situated to the right of the post of the stitch.
- Recognizing sts on the Wrong Side (WS) of your work: There are also a few rounds where you work with the WS of the sts facing you. When this is the case, the loop of the stitch comes after the post of the stitch, in other words: the loop of the stitch is situated to the left of the post of the stitch.
- Hidden sts: It is important to not miss sts, to make sure you have the correct stitch count. When a stitch is made after 1 or more chains, the loop of the stitch will become harder to see, this is especially the case with the first stitch after the corner and even more so with dc and htr. These sts are indicated in the pattern with the word (hidden), so you will pay extra attention to these sts.

### **Omitting stitches of the last repeat**

In the pattern you might see instructions telling you to omit the last st(s) of the last repeat. This means that your last repeat should stop before these indicated st(s), because you will have already made them before the repeat started.

### **Joining a new ball of yarn**

You can use this method to join a new ball of yarn in the middle of a round.

In the last stitch using the old ball of yarn:

1. Work the last stitch in the old yarn until you have two loops left on your hook.
2. Drop the yarn end of the old yarn.
3. Pick up the new ball of yarn by pulling a loop of the new colour through both loops on your hook. This will complete the stitch.
4. Work away the ends as normal.

Now you can continue your work.

### **Blocking**

Blocking in-between parts is not necessary, we will do this once the complete blanket is made to finish it off! Blocking will give your final blanket a neater and more even appearance. I like to use the wet blocking-method:

1. Make a little bath for your blanket with lukewarm water.
2. Submerge your project in the water and let it sit until it is fully wet.
3. Squeeze out the water gently (DO NOT WRING).
4. Roll your blanket in some towels and press excess water out.
5. Pin your blanket to the right size and shape using rust-free pins. Use blocking mats, towels or anything that has an even, soft and flat surface to pin your blanket to. Do not try to stretch it out too much. You want nice and straight edges.
6. Leave it until it is completely dry, before removing the pins.
