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MATERIALS

Simy's Studio Yarn Hope DK Weight (100% Superwash Merino Wool; 100g/300m)

Yarn A 04 If you build it, they will come x 3 (3: 4: 4: 5) skeins

Yarn B 06 Love will find a way x 2 (2: 2: 3: 3) skeins

Yarn C 05 It's never too late x 1 (1: 1: 1) skein

Yarn D 07 Mighty oaks grow from little acorns x 2 (2: 2: 3: 3) skeins

2.5mm and 3mm knitting needles

2.5mm circular knitting needles, 40cm long

Removable stitch markers (optional)

GAUGE/TENSION

25.5 sts and 33 rows to measure $10 \times 10 \text{cm}$ over st st using 3 mm needles

PATTERN NOTES

Where possible: blend old and new skeins of Hope for 1 or 2 cm before changing skein.

Jumper is worked flat in separate pieces for Front, Back and Sleeves. Shoulder seams are joined before picking up sts to work Neckband in the round using circular needles.

When reading charts, read RS rows from right to left and WS rows from left to right. Follow the start and end sts for the size being worked.

INSTRUCTIONS

BACK

Using 2.5mm knitting needles and Yarn C, cast on 115 (127: 141: 153: 165) sts.

Row 1 (RS) K1, (p1, k1) to end.

Row 2 (WS) P1, (k1, p1) to end.

These 2 rows form rib.

Work in rib until Back meas 5cm from cast-on edge, ending with a WS row.

Change to 3mm needles.

Work Colourwork Chart 1a: Body in st st throughout.

Back should now meas approx 41cm from cast-on edge.

Armhole Shaping

Work Colourwork 1b: Body and AT THE SAME TIME cast off 4 (4: 4: 6: 8) sts at beg of next 2 rows. [107 (119: 133: 141: 149) sts]**
Dec 1 st at beg and end of every alt row 8 (8: 10: 10: 12) times.
[91 (103: 113: 121: 125) sts]

Cont in patt until armhole meas 21 (22: 23: 24: 25.5)cm from beg of Armhole Shaping, ending with a WS row.

Shape Back Neck

Row 1 (RS) Patt 28 (34: 38: 42: 44) sts, cast off 35 (35: 37: 37: 37) sts, patt to end. [28 (34: 38: 42: 44) sts at either side of neck] Now work each side of neck separately.

Shape Left Back Neck

Row 2 (WS) Patt to end.

Row 3 (RS) Cast off 3 sts, patt to end. [25 (31: 35: 39: 41) sts]

Row 4 Patt to end.

Cast off all sts.

Shape Right Back Neck

Work rem 28 (34: 38: 42: 44) sts for right side of Back Neck as folls: **Row 2 (WS)** Cast off 3 sts, patt to end. [25 (31: 35: 39: 41) sts]

Row 3 (RS) Patt to end.

Row 4 Patt to end.

Cast off all sts.

FRONT

Work as Back to **.

Cont in patt until armhole meas 13 (14: 15: 16: 17.5)cm from beg of Armhole Shaping, ending with a WS row.

Shape Front Neck

Row 1 (RS) Patt 37 (43: 47: 50: 52) sts, cast off 17 (17: 19: 21: 21) sts, patt to end. [37 (43: 47: 50: 52) sts at either side of neck] Now work each side of neck separately.

Shape Right Front Neck

Work first 37 (43: 47: 50: 52) sts as folls:

Row 2 and all foll WS rows Patt to end.

Row 3 Cast off 3 sts, patt to end.

Row 5 Cast off 2 sts, patt to end.

Row 7 Cast off 2 sts, patt to end.

Row 9 Cast off 2 (2: 2: 1)st(s), patt to end.

Row 11 Cast off 1 st, patt to end.

Row 13 Cast off 1 st, patt to end.

Row 15 Cast off 1 st, patt to end.

Cont in patt until armhole meas 22 (23: 24: 25: 26.5)cm from beg of Armhole Shaping, ending with a WS row.

Cast off rem 25 (31: 35: 38: 41) sts.

Shape Left Front Neck

Work first 37 (43: 47: 50: 52) sts as folls:

Row 2 (WS) Cast off 3 sts, patt to end.

Row 3 and all foll RS rows Patt to end.

Row 4 Cast off 2 sts, patt to end.

Row 6 Cast off 2 sts, patt to end.

Row 8 Cast off 2 (2: 2: 1) st(s), patt to end.

Row 10 Cast off 1 st, patt to end.

Row 12 Cast off 1 st, patt to end.

Row 14 Cast off 1 st, patt to end.

Row 16 Patt to end.

Cont in patt until armhole meas 22 (23: 24: 25: 26.5)cm from beg of Armhole Shaping, ending with a WS row.

Cast off rem 25 (31: 35: 38: 41) sts.

SLEEVE (MAKE 2)

Using 2.5mm needles and Yarn C, cast on 61 (61: 63: 63: 65) sts.

Row 1 (RS) K1, (p1, k1) to end.

Row 2 (RS) P1, (k1, p1) to end.

These 2 rows form rib.

Work in rib until Back meas 5cm from cast-on edge, ending with a WS row.

Change to 3mm needles.

Work Colourwork Chart 2: Sleeve in st st and AT THE SAME TIME inc by 1 st at each side of sleeve on next and every foll 8th

(7th: 7th: 6th: 6th) row, 15 (18: 19: 21: 22) times in total. [91 (97: 101: 105: 109) sts]

Work straight until Sleeve meas 47 (49: 49: 50: 51)cm from cast-on edge.

Shape Sleeve Cap

Work Colourwork Chart 3: Sleeve Cap in st st and AT THE SAME TIME cast off 4 (4: 4: 6: 8) sts at beg of next 2 rows. [83 (89: 93: 93: 93) sts] **

Dec 1 st on both sides every 4th (4th: 4th: 4th: 4th) row, 4 (3: 2: 3: 7) times, then every 3rd (3rd: 3rd: 3rd: 3rd) row 4 (3: 3: 3: 3) times, then every other row 4 (10: 13: 14: 6) times, and then every row 14 (13: 12: 9: 13) times. [31 (31: 33: 35: 35) sts]
Cast off rem sts.

NECKBAND

Join shoulder seams.

Using 40cm-long 2.5mm needles and Yarn C, beg at top of left shoulder seam with RS facing and pick up and k98 (98: 102: 106: 106) sts evenly around Front and Back.

Join to work in the round and place sm to mark beg of round.

Round 1 (RS) (K1, p1) to end.

Round 1 forms rib.

Work in rib until Neckband meas 5.5cm from picked-up edge. Cast off in rib.

ASSEMBLY


Join Sleeves to body, then join side seams and sleeve seams. Turn jumper inside out and fold down Neckband so cast-off sts sit on inner picked-up edge. Use removable sm to attach in position (optional).

Sew each cast-off st of Neckband to picked-up edge, inserting needle into the cast-off edge and then into WS of body. Take care not to pull the yarn too tightly.

TO FINISH


Weave in all ends and block to measurements.

Colourwork Chart 1a: Body



Each square in close up of colourwork indicates 1 st. The centre of Body is the 58th (64th: 71st: 77th: 83rd) st.




Row 49 Knit centre st as shown above in Yarn B. **Rows 50-93** Add 1 st in Yarn B to each side of Yarn B section, creating a triangular shape.




Row 94 Knit centre st as shown above in Yarn A. Rows 95-118 Add 1 st in Yarn A to each side of Yarn A section, creating a triangular shape.

Colourwork Chart 1b: Body




Cont in colourwork patt as set in Chart 1a: Body.



Row 22 Knit centre st as shown above in Yarn D. Rows 22-104 Add 1 st in Yarn D to each side of Yarn D section, creating a triangular shape.

When all sts are in Yarn D, cont in Yarn D only.

Colourwork Chart 2: Sleeve






Row 98 Knit centre st as shown above in Yarn B. **Rows 98-125** Add 1 st in Yarn B to each side of Yarn B section, creating a triangular shape.



Row 126 Knit centre st as shown above in Yarn A. **Rows 127-136** Add 1 st in Yarn A to each side of Yarn A section, creating a triangular shape.

Colourwork Chart 3: Sleeve Cap



Cont in colourwork patt as set in Chart 2: Sleeve.



Row 54 (Sleeve cap) Knit centre st as shown above in Yarn D. **Rows 55-80** Add 1 st in Yarn D to each side of Yarn D section, creating a triangular shape.
